The development of the administrative structure as per UGC Regulations was discussed in the Research Staff /IQAC Working Group of the Institute in its meeting held on 30th April, 2019.	The Institute submitted its revised MoA and Rules modified as per UGC (Institutes Deemed to be Universities) Regulations 2016.
Need to enhance student enrollment was discussed in the research Staff /IQAC Working Group meeting held on 30th July 2018.	The Academic Council and Board of Management approved the proposal and syllabus for introducing an Undergraduate programme -B.Sc Economics from the academic year 2019-20. The syllabus was discussed thoroughly and revised several times in IQAC Working Group/Research Staff, before placing the same for approval by Academic Council. This programme will improve the student enrolment and also impart quality education for the Undergraduate programme. An entrance examination for the Undergraduate programme was conducted, on 9th June 2019 in major cities of the country in order to attract the best students.
The Institute did not have 12 B status, which is mandatory by the UGC to secure funding.	Efforts were made by the Institute to ensure that 12 B status was secured. Accordingly a UGC Inspection Committee visited the Institute between 14th and 15th December 2018. During the visit, presentations were made by the officials of the Institute on the academic and other activities conducted by the Institute. After thorough inspection, the committee recommended approval of 12 B status to Gokhale Institute of Politics and Economics (Deemed to be University), Pune, Maharashtra vide letter dated

	13th February 2019 F. No.1-1/2012(CPP-IDU). The Commission ratified the recommendations of the Committee on 29.01.2019 and accordingly the Institute was granted 12 B Status.
In order to encourage students to present papers in seminars and conferences, the Institute will provide travel grant to those students whose papers are accepted in prestigious national level conferences and seminars. This discussion was made in the Research Staff/IQAC Working Group meeting held on October 19th, 2018.	Students whose papers have been accepted have submitted their application for travel grant.
The Government of Maharashtra issued a letter on 27th August, 2018 regarding biometric attendance. This issue was discussed in the Research Staff/IQAC Working Group meeting held on 26th September, 2018	From 1st October 2018, the Institute immediately implemented biometric attendance.
