AG-02 Sociology of Sanitation of Indian Sociological Society (ISS)

Throughout history, people have devised systems to get water into their communities and households and dispose of wastewater conveniently. Though the rivers were the source of water for the early settlements, rivers would serve as a crude form of natural sewage disposal. Early civilizations like Greece, Rome, Mesopotamia, Persia, China, Harappa and Mohenjodaro had extensive networks of water supply and sewage systems.

Sanitation refers to the formulation and application of measures designed to protect public health. It also refers to safe conditions which includes clean and safe water supply, clean and safe ambient air, efficient and safe animal, human, and industrial waste disposal, protection of food from biological and chemical contaminants and adequate housing in clean and safe surroundings. Practically, sanitation is any system that promotes proper disposal of human and animal wastes, proper use of toilets and avoiding open space defecation. Inadequate sanitation is a major cause of disease worldwide and improving sanitation is known to have a significant beneficial impact on health both in households and across communities.

Sociology has developed rapidly since World War II, resulting in an increase in the specializations within the general field of sociology. Recently, the importance of sanitation in human society forced social scientists to improve the sociology of sanitation as a specialized study in sociology. Thus, the relationship between people and human society enabled further developments in the sociology of sanitation.

The sociology of sanitation is the study of human action which includes the individual, community, and public policies, for the betterment of sanitary measures in the environment therefore Gokhale Institute of Politics and Economics, Pune and AG-02 Sociology of Sanitation of ISS, organises a mid-term conference on *Sanitation: Issues, Challenges and Future Directions* for the development of Indian Society.

Prof. R. Indira, former President of the Indian Sociological Society, is a retired Professor and Chairperson of the Department of Sociology at the University of Mysore. She has served as Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Director of the Centre for Women's Studies. A recipient of two Fulbright fellowships and several other prestigious fellowships, she has led numerous national and international research projects on social issues. Prof. Indira has authored and edited numerous books and articles in English and Kannada, and has been recognized for her contributions to academia and literature.

Prof. Maitrayee Chaudhuri, President of the Indian Sociological Society and retired from JNU's Centre for the Study of Social Systems, has focused her research on public discourse in modern India, with early work on nationalism, colonialism, and feminism. Her later research addresses neoliberalism and majoritarianism. She has held visiting positions at Harvard, the University of Massachusetts, and Albert Ludwig University, and contributed to UNESCO's study on women and intangible heritage. Prof. Chaudhuri also coordinated the JNU Global Studies MA Program with universities in Germany and South Africa.
